

## HISTORY

The Savannah Sport Fishing Club is an organization whose principal objectives are founded on the beliefs that the sport of gamefish angling is an important recreational, economic, and social activity which its members should pursue in a manner consistent with sound sporting and conservation practices.

The objectives of the Club are many: To promote offshore gamefish angling by holding regularly scheduled tournaments and maintaining records to recognize anglers and skippers; To promote fair angling regulations and compile and maintain Club record data for fish caught according to these regulations; To keep its members informed through various activities such as educational programs, newsletter, annual handbook and subscriptions to sportfishing magazines; To support the gamefish tagging program to aid scientific and educational institutions; To promote safety among its members and to provide social activities for the sharing of ideas and experiences.

The Savannah Sport Fishing Club was begun in 1966 by an enthusiastic and ambitious group of sportfishermen whose main objectives were to have organized tournaments and promote safety among its members. Members of the newly formed Club had been fishing offshore for many years. However, organized tournaments were not seriously considered until a severe storm caught six boats fishing offshore in 1966. A disaster was averted, but the incident provided the stimulus for the foundation of organized activities. Neil Mingledorff was instrumental in organizing the Club, and served as its first president in 1967. The history of the Club is filled with events which are worthy of mention:

1968 - Tournament rules were written and a scoring system was devised to provide recognition to anglers and skippers. The Kerr-McGee Co. was denied a permit to mine phosphate in the Little Tybee Island area. The Club had a membership of 108, with over 90 owning boats.

1969 - Buoys were made for fishing drops to be designated by the Chart Committee. A subscription to "Salt Water Sportsman" was ordered for each member for the first time.

1970 - Buoys were placed on fifteen offshore fishing drops. A fishing chart was prepared and printed. Tommy "T" Smith caught the first blue marlin off the Georgia coast. The marlin weighed 280 pounds. Rules governing the Club, conduct of tournaments, and recognition of anglers and skippers were approved.

1971 - Buoys placed on the fifteen fishing drops a year earlier were missing, and were replaced. A Club handbook was compiled and given to all members. The Club was incorporated as of August 23, 1971.

1972 - Fishing drop buoys were again missing and had to be replaced. The first Club invitational billfish tournament was held, and two marlin and one sailfish were caught. The Club began participating in the Woods Hole Tagging Program.

1973 - A tire reef was built, 105° and five miles off R2W. The reef was officially named "Kitten's Corner" in recognition of W.W. Buckhaults' contribution to the establishment of the reef. Club member Dr. Frank Carlton, formed the National Coalition for Marine Conservation.

1974 - The State of Georgia, using the support of the Club, established state gamefish records. Plans were implemented to establish a joint VHF radio station with the Savannah Yacht Club.

1975 - A base station VHF radio and a 100' tower with a superstation master antenna were installed at the Savannah Yacht Club as a joint project of the two clubs. A trophy was given to the Club in remembrance of Ted Darvoe to be used to recognize the top angler of the year.

1976 - The first white marlin caught off Georgia was landed by Joe Frazier. The mount was donated to the Club. A Club burgee was adopted.

1977 - The Bobby Haynes Memorial Trophy, a perpetual trophy, was established to recognize the top skipper in the Billfish Tournament in remembrance of Captain Bobby Haynes. Bruce Ford caught the first swordfish in this area. The first annual Kingfish Tournament was held.

1978 - A letter-writing campaign appeared to have assured the relocation of Coast Guard Station Tybee to Cockspur Island. Because of a lack of participation in monthly tournaments, a special committee proposed rules to recognize boats and skippers fishing in three different offshore areas.

1979 - New fishing tournament rules were adopted by the general membership. The maximum membership was increased to 175.

1980 - A Club Handbook was published for each of the members. Social activities and improved weigh-in procedures were instituted to encourage increased tournament participation.

1981 - The By-Laws were revised and adopted by the membership. The Club reached the allowed 175 members.

1982 - An artificial reef program was begun. Reef material was donated, but a barge was unavailable for transporting the material to the site. A new club burgee was adopted.



1983 - The Club added 400 tons of concrete pipe to artificial reef "L." The first annual Young Peoples' Fishing Tournament was held.

1984 - The Reef Committee coordinated the sinking of an 80 x 35 foot barge at the "KC" reef.

1985 - Participation and record catches characterized the year. Members set new State records for Blue Marlin and Dolphin. Renewed interest in surf fishing and the use of live baits offshore resulted in new Club line class records for a number of species.

1986 - Continuing its support of sound conservation practices, the Club revised its tournament rules to accommodate the new Federal and State limitations placed on diminished fish stocks.

1987 - The Club takes a more active role in preserving coastal resources, particularly in the protection of "live bottom" habitats in the South Atlantic, including the Snapper Banks.

1988 - The continued participation and increasingly active role in conservation practices, as well as dedication to our young anglers, characterized the Club's interest in promoting a clean and wholesome future for the next generation, the environment, and sport fishing.

1989 - The Club Directors and membership created a new Honorary Member category to recognize the original charter members of the club who were continuously active members at the 1989 Annual Meeting. They are: Neil Mingledorff, Arthur Fleming, Archie Morris, Bill Hopkins, Gene Tanner and W.W. Buckhaults, M.D.

1990 - The Club reversed a sliding financial outlook and became more financially sound during 1990. Also, a significant increase in tournament participation was achieved.

1991 - The Club celebrated its 25th year. A separate category was established for competition for the Inshore fishermen. The Club purchased portable electronic scales for tournament weigh-ins.

1992 - The Club reached 200 members and the maximum membership level was raised to 225. The Annual Membership Meeting included a slide presentation covering the first 25 years of SSFC activities.

1993 - The Club membership reached 225. The Club's financial position was strong enough to structure a Long Range Planning Committee for implementation starting in 1994.

1994 - The Long Range Planning Committee was implemented and chaired by Past President Woody Woodward. The committee's efforts resulted in an expanded Powder Puff Tournament and several "no cost to members" events such as an oyster roast and a special meeting to honor retiring Weigh Master Cindy Sanders. These and other recommendations will result in greater member benefits in the future.

1995 - A new perpetual trophy was created to be presented annually to the top Young Angler of the Year. This trophy was given to the Club by several members in memory of Past President Woody Woodward, who passed away in 1995. A new tournament format was inaugurated in 1995 to combine the Kingfish and Billfish Tournaments into a new Shoot-Out Tournament. The first event was a great success.

1996 - Following a Club donation to build the nearshore reef "DUA," a permanent Fund Raising Committee was established, the purpose of which is to coordinate fund raising efforts throughout the year, to establish guidelines for sponsor recognition, and to provide a special projects fund which can then be applied to our marine environment. Such projects would include continuing support of Georgia's offshore artificial reef program, assistance for marker buoy lighting and maintenance, and other worthy projects which would promote the safe and enjoyable use of our coastal resources.

1997 - The first Annual Fund Raising Banquet and Auction was held at the Forest City Gun Club and was an unqualified success. Interest far outweighed tickets available for the event and funds generated for the Club's Special Projects Fund met and exceeded projected estimates.

1998 - The Club assisted the Georgia DNR in the placing of the first deep water reef in the history of the state. The Club's Special Projects Fund paid for a tug to tow a 200 foot barge fifty miles offshore to 150 feet of water, between the Deli and the South Ledge. The barge was then sunk to provide the first deep water reef off Georgia's coast.

1999 - Innovation was the byword for the year. Many new ideas were tried, including fewer tournaments, tournaments within tournaments, scoring changes, weigh-in time changes, and others. Some ideas were discarded, some kept into the new millennium. 1999 also marked the year the Club went on the World Wide Web, with the formation of its Internet Website at [www.ssf.org](http://www.ssf.org).

In recognition of the Club's origins and continued relationship with the Savannah Yacht Club, memorabilia from the past season, a copy of the 1999 Member Handbook and a copy of the Shoot-Out '99 program, is presented to the SYC for inclusion in their time capsule honoring the new millennium.

2000 - The Club participated in two high profile endeavors on the State level. First, the Club's annual Shoot-Out Tournament hosted a leg of the Georgia Governor's Cup Billfish Series. A total of 45 boats fished the tournament, 8 of the top 10 places in the 40 boat field were captured by Club members.

Second, with our largest donation to the DNR to date, the Club assisted in a very ambitious and significant project- the renourishment of four artificial reefs off the Georgia coast. Four tugboats were purchased and sunk, including two in our waters- an 88' tug at the "J" reef, and a 98' tug at the "W.W." (Woody Woodward) reef.

2001 - The Club's membership held firm at 225 with several on the waiting list. The Club's financial position was leaner than years past but all events were funded and the special projects fund received 100% of its annual allotment. Involvement in the Georgia Governor's Cup Billfish Series continued.

2002 - The Club continued its growth thanks to a very sound financial position. Emphasis was placed on increasing tournament participation and offering opportunities for all fisherman in every event. The Club continued its support of the Georgia Governors Cup Billfish Series and our special projects fund was fully funded.

2003 - During our annual Shakedown Tournament the Club held for the first time a "Sponsor Appreciation" night. Sponsors were invited for dinner, socializing, and were encouraged to showcase their products for members and guests. For the first time in recent memory a club member, Greg Cole, caught and released a Bluefin Tuna in our coastal waters. This new and exciting winter fishery was explored by many of our club members as the Bluefin Tuna were being caught 10 to 20 miles offshore.

2004 - The In-shore Tournament is always a favorite among club members. This year's tournament set a club record with eighty-two anglers participating. Through our Special Projects Fund, we are continuing to work with the Department of Natural Resources to obtain suitable vessels and locations with-in our waters to establish a new artificial reef. The National Weather Service has been in contact with our club to solicit opinions from our fishermen, whom frequently depend on the marine forecast. They are in the process of establishing new criteria that will be more helpful to boaters.

2005 - The In-Shore tournament broke last year's record setting participation of eighty two anglers by an amazing 20% pushing the number of anglers fished to 98, weighing in over 400 lbs of fish, almost every piece of which was consumed at the fish fry on Sunday following the event. This puts this event at the top of our tournament scheduled in terms of participation. The club returned to full capacity, 225 members, for the first time following our dues increase a few years back, and the membership ratified a board recommendation to establish a waiting list not to exceed 25 people. As of this writing, we have eight people on the waiting list, and this process will help us maintain the membership at our capacity.

The club has pledged \$10,000 of our special projects fund to support the Peach State Reds stocking program, which will take place in Wassaw Sound in 2006, assuming all goes well with the hatching project. It will be interesting to see what impact this has on the in-shore fishing over time. As a club, we need to encourage our members to retain a portion of the fins of cleaned fish to give to the DNR for DNA analysis. This is the primary manner by which the success of this program will be measured. We continue to pursue reef development with the DNR; however, their funding has been severely limited over the past few years due to State budget constraints. Perhaps 2006 will be the year for further development of our offshore reef system.

# **Pro South Irrigation**

2006 - The In-Shore tournament broke last year's record setting participation. This puts this event at the top of our tournament schedule in terms of participation. The club maintained full capacity, 225 members, throughout the year with a few names on the waiting list at year-end. The DNR/CCA Peach State Reds first year stocking program released around 1,000,000 fish about 2 centimeters long at several release sites along the Wilmington River and in Wassaw Sound. Only time will tell us if the program achieves the anticipated results. It will be interesting to see what impact this has on the in-shore fishing over time. As a club, we need to encourage our members to retain a portion of the fins of cleaned fish to give to the DNR for DNA analysis. This is the primary manner by which the success of this program will be measured. We continue to pursue reef development with the DNR; however, their funding has been severely limited over the past few years due to State budget constraints. It remains to be seen if 2007 will offer us an opportunity to participate in new reef development.

2007- For the first time in club history a waiting list for membership was established. By year end, there were 22 prospective members on the list. Participation in the club tournaments was higher than in previous years and with the influx of new members over the last couple of years, participation should continue to increase in 2008. After a number of years the club was actually able to find a reef project to fund. The board voted at the last official meeting of the year to fund the Peach State Reds Initiative and the reef project with a combined \$36,000. The tournament committees still find it to be a challenge to establish tournament rules that enable as many boaters to fish the tournaments while still keeping the safety of the fisherman in mind. Again weather wreaked havoc on the Blue Water and the Powder Puff tournaments. 2008 will bring another year of change in the rules by which we fish due to the enforcement of the circle hook rule for tournaments that target billfish.

2008- The club ended the year with 9 people on the waiting list and the participation at tournaments was high. The members voted a dues increase at the August general meeting and also established a process to have smaller increment increase each year which should prevent any large dues increase in future years.

In April, Richard Coomer, Brent Bazemore and Lee Yates attended the Department of Natural Resources Board Meeting and accepted a Declaration thanking the club for contributions over the years building the offshore reefs.

The Bluewater and inshore tournaments were once again well attended, and with a lot of planning, the participants actually got to fish the Bluewater tournament. Thanks to the number of volunteers the club's events went well, and the cooking and cleaning committee did a stellar job with the food.

2009- Our cooking crew has surpassed itself, if that was possible, by continuing to upgrade the food quality and selections, while using creative funding to allow them to maintain budgets and increase their cooking equipment. Even during tough economic times our sponsors have stepped up and continued to support the club.

2010- Board meetings were exciting due to changes made in the tournament fish day for areas A, B, and C. In an effort to increase participation and safety offshore anglers now are permitted to fish any day they choose starting Saturday before a general tournament through the Saturday scheduled for the tournament.

The 2010 cooking crew ROCKS! Our guys and their wives are the best. They continually offer the membership a tremendous variety on each occasion. Our guests cannot believe our buffets are provided by club members and not catered.

2011 - The year started with a bang, or rather a hail storm during the shakedown meeting that had everyone looking for cover. The Young Angler's Tournament was once again extremely well attended. The club saw multiple Billfish and Tarpon releases thru the season. Even thru a slumping economy, the fund raising committee did a great job allowing the club to enter 2012 in a sound fiscal position. It's getting to be old hat, but once again the cooking committee blew everyone away with the diversity and quality of food at our events.

2012 - The year started off with another great major fund-raising event. Despite a continued stagnant economy, our members really stepped up and contributed over 30K to the Club. Our major tournaments were blessed with good weather this year were all well attended and the Club's Annual Bluewater Invitational Tournament celebrated it's 40th Anniversary. General tournament participants also continued to enjoy expanded fishing days, in order to accommodate as many anglers as possible. Of course, the Cooking Crew surpassed all expectations yet again, with an ever increasing menu variety and wonderful food. As the year came to an end, the Board looked forward to implementing an online member's forum and considering other exciting sites to host special tournaments.

2013 - The Annual Angler Championship Awards resulted in ties for both Inshore and Offshore divisions. It was definitely a competitive year. Although the Powder Puff offshore was blown out, all the other specialty tournaments went off well. In fact, Bojangle's Famous Chicken 'n Biscuits donated \$10,000 towards the Blue Water top award to spice things up! The Club also held its May 4th General Tournament at River Street thanks to sponsorship by Savannah Candy Kitchen.

2014 - After stabilizing over the past few years, the SSFC club membership ranks began to grow again. Tournament participation was outstanding with many new members taking part. In fact, there were a number of tournaments where we completely filled up the leaderboard! The Georgia DNR approached the SSFC about funding for the Joe's Cut Artificial Reef Restoration. The club agreed to fund \$12,000 once the DNR demonstrates that it can build a sustainable reef structure there.

2015 - The Club continued its work with Georgia DNR on two projects, Joe's Cut Inshore Reef and a new nearshore reef called BSF. The DNR will finish up their test deployment assessments at Joe's Cut early next year and will finally determine if it is a sustainable site. If so, the Club will fund the initial Joe's Cut reef development in 2016 (\$12,000). With the Club's help, the DNR determined a suitable site for the BSF reef and has moved into the permitting phase for this project. At the October 2015 Board Meeting, Olin "T" Smith was designated as a Honorary Member and he was officially honored during the Inshore Awards Banquet. To improve member knowledge in inshore artificial lure fishing, the Club held an artificial lure only inshore tournament that included seminars by our more accomplished lure fisherman. The Club continued to have excellent Board activity and member participation while remaining fiscally stable.

2016 – The club turned 50 years old this year and we did so in grand fashion with food at every weigh-in, a 50th year logo for all shirts and merchandise and an anniversary party at the Savannah Yacht Club. The entire year was a great success and everyone that contributed deserves a huge thank you. The membership was capped at 165 this year. It was a tough year for offshore fishing with numerous tournament days cancelled. Our inshore angler competition continues to be strong with increased participation. Sponsorship was again very generous and allowed us to have high quality events and tournaments.

2017 – It was another difficult year for the offshore fishing teams, especially the Bluewater Division, only two boats were able to fish Area C. We did have a number of boats fish Areas A and B, but they were limited to only 4 fishable tournaments, the rest of the tournaments were cancelled due to weather. The inshore division continues to be strong with 33 boats fishing and 56 anglers. The Lady's Powderpuff and Kid's Young Angler Tournaments continued to be very successful with a large amount of participation. The Annual Bluewater Tournament was also a success with a few more boats participating than the previous year. The Greenwater Tournament had a very large turnout this year. It was the largest number of boats and anglers participating for this tournament in many years. The inshore tournament was dedicated to current and past veterans and was a huge success. The club reached its membership cap of 165 with a waiting list. The club sponsored the Georgia Department of Natural Resources near shore reef project called BSF50 (Beach Sport Fishing 50 Years). Club Sponsorship was again very generous and allowed us to have high quality events and tournaments.

2018 – It was another great year for the club. Participation was up in both general and major tournaments. The club membership cap was increased to 175 members. At our annual meeting the board of directors introduced Bruce Greene as our newest "Honorary Member." Older Than Dirt - really isn't true but he has been an active member of the club since 1974. He was very instrumental in advancing fishing techniques and practices, as well as being a very dedicated board member. The club continued its conservation practice by supporting the Georgia DNR's enhancement of the BSF Reef with funds from our Special Projects account.

2020 – The year started with much optimism and a hugely successful Oyster Roast that fortunately fell before the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic and Shelter in Place orders began. The Board resolved to provide a great member experience while remaining committed to not jeopardizing health and safety of its members and guests. Despite being in "Uncharted Waters" all year, the Club successfully modified weigh in locations (Savannah Bend Marina) and implemented safety protocols to facilitate some great competitive fishing tournaments. Although the Powderpuff Tournament was cancelled, the Club did hold 5 General Tournaments as well as the Bluewater, Young Angler, Greenwater, and Inshore Tournaments. The Bluewater Tournament was marked by the first Mary Buck Trophy, which is awarded to the top Lady Angler in the Bluewater Tournament. Due to limited social activities relating to the COVID 19 Pandemic, there were no winners of the Rosalind Demere Memorial Trophy or the James Lynah Perpetual Trophy. We wrapped up the year up by honoring Fred Buck, Michael Fleming, Pat Hahn and Barnie Portman with honorary memberships.

2021 – The year got off to a somewhat slow start as the Oyster Roast had to be postponed due to continued COVID-19 concerns. Fortunately, the club was able to successfully combine the Oyster Roast with the Shakedown captain’s meeting for a great event to kick off the year. The club was able to return its tournament weigh ins to the Savannah Yacht Club with great success. The tournaments had some of the highest levels of participation and competition on record. The year was capped off by honoring Stan Strickland, a great long time member and advocate of Sport Fishing, with honorary membership.

2022 – This was the first year we could truly get back to normal. No more pandemic, no more shutdowns, and a club full of members ready to get back to doing what we love. Starting with the Oyster Roast, and into the Shakedown; every event was attended with great numbers showing the healthy state of the club. Speaking of the health of the club, by mid year the membership as well as waiting list was fully capped. Tournament wise, area I was very highly competitive, with the club seeing increased participation in both numbers of boats and individuals weighing in. The offshore areas had a tougher year just trying to find good weather windows, but when we got them they brought fish to the scales. The Bluewater was the standout event of the year. More boats fishing and more billfish being caught than ever and setting the foundation for the future. The club’s recommendation was instrumental in the USCG’s decision to permanently convert DBN 38 to LT 38 and improve safe navigation.

#### CLUB HISTORIAN(S)

Duties and responsibilities: The Club historian(s) are to document and archive all significant events and milestones pertaining to the Club. Through interviews with charter members, others, and records research, they shall reconstruct and maintain the historical records of the Club. They may utilize a variety of media in preserving the Club’s history, including but not limited to paper documents, photographs, videos, newspaper articles and electronic files. They should coordinate with the Secretary to publish, as needed, specific historical information on the web site.

Reports to: The historian reports to the current President and receives guidance from the executive board.

Appointment: The historian(s) are a non-board, ongoing position appointed as needed by the current past president.

#### SSFC SPECIAL PROJECT FUNDS AT WORK

1996 The Board votes to create and implement a Special Project Fund which will enable the Club to participate financially when the DNR approaches us with a project.

1996 DUA Reef — \$10,000.00 (sunk barge and high relief materials)

1997 Dues increase from \$100.00/year to \$130.00/year for the specific purpose of allowing the Club to fund the Special Projects account with \$6,000.00/year.

1998 Deep Water “DW” Reef — \$3,000.00 (sunk 200’ barge)

2000 Woody Woodward “WW” Reef — \$10,000.00 (sunk 98’ foot tug boat Semarca 40)

2000 J Reef — \$10,000.00 (sunk 88’ tug boat Rio Apon)

2005 Peach State Reds Initiative — \$10,000.00 (Redfish stocking program in Wassaw Sound)

2007 Peach State Reds Initiative — \$10,000.00; NYC subway cars deployed at “L” reef in recognition of conservation efforts of Jim Lynah — \$26,000.00

2009 Special Project Funds were funded at the normal annual rate of \$6,000. On January 6, 2010 forty-four New York Transit Authority Subway Cars that the SSFC help fund were sunk at Reef JY. The rendezvous site was 31 35.535N 80 49.276W. The actual coordinates are to be released by the DNR before June 1, 2010.

2016 The club elected to use funds from our Special Projects Account to assist the Georgia Department of Natural Resources with reef enhancements for the inshore reef project at Joe’s Cut. The club allocated \$12,000.00.

2017 This year we were able to continue our involvement with the Georgia Department of Natural Resources on a near shore reef project called BSF50 (Beach Sport Fishing 50 Years). BSF50 is located four nautical miles southeast of Little Tybee Island in an area 30 feet deep at high tide. Seventy-two pallet balls, 5ft in diameter, 3ft tall and weighing approximately 1,300 tons and 24 concrete sinkers, 5ft wide, 2ft tall and weighing between 2 and 3 tons were deployed outward from the reef center point (31°54.089’N / 80°50.073’W) along a north - south path over the reef site in order to create a trolling alley for those targeting king and Spanish mackerel. The concrete materials will soon be colonized by barnacles, soft corals and sponges providing the basis of a food web that will attract saltwater gamefish such as grouper, sheepshead, black sea bass and king mackerel, as well as numerous other species that use the reef as foraging and refuge habitat. The members of the SSFC have always been very generous in support of projects that enhance fishing in and around Savannah. We hope to continue to provide funding to enhance this reef project as well as others in order to provide years of enjoyment for anglers of all ages.

2018 \$5000.00 was funded from our Special Projects Account for further enhancements to the BSF Reef.

# AMENDED BYLAWS OF THE SAVANNAH SPORT FISHING CLUB, INC.

## ARTICLE I

This club shall be known as the Savannah Sport Fishing Club, Inc. The membership of the club shall be limited to a number as fixed from time to time by the Board of Directors.

## ARTICLE II

### Board of Directors

1. The Board of Directors shall be composed of twelve (12) members, with the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer and the Immediate Past President as ex-officio members. Four of the twelve Directors shall be elected at the annual meeting to serve for a period of three years. Immediately following the annual meeting of the Club, the new Board of Directors shall elect a president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer who shall hold office for one year, from the time of the election or until their successors are elected. No director can succeed himself without a lapse of one year, except that any director who has not served a full term may be re-elected.
2. The Board shall have general charge of the affairs, funds and property of the Club, shall have the power to prescribe rules and regulations for the proper government of the Club's affairs, and is vested with the full power to carry out the purposes of the Club according to its Charters and Bylaws.
3. The Board shall have full power to fill vacancies that may occur among the members of the board.
4. A Nominating Committee, appointed by the President, consisting of not less than five members, and including at least one board member and the Immediate Past President, shall make the selection of nominees for directors. A meeting of the Nominating Committee shall be held at least two weeks prior to the election.
5. Any board member who misses three board meetings during the year shall be replaced unless such absences have been excused by the Board.

## ARTICLE III

### Meetings

1. The Annual Banquet and Awards meeting of the Club shall be held during December at a time and place designated by the President, and a notice of this meeting shall be sent to each member at least twenty (20) days in advance of the meeting. Ten per cent of the membership shall constitute a quorum.
2. Special meetings shall be called by the Board of Directors at a written request of ten per cent of the membership, and notice of such a meeting setting forth the purpose of the call shall be sent to each member at least

five (5) days before the day appointed for said meeting.

3. The Board of Directors shall meet monthly, except that any monthly meeting may be omitted by a majority vote of the Directors present at the preceding meeting.
4. Nine members and/or ex-officio members shall constitute a quorum of the Board of Directors.
5. General membership meetings will be held each year as scheduled by the Board of Directors. The membership must be notified of the meeting schedule prior to the first Club tournament.

## ARTICLE IV

### Duties of the Officers

1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the Club and the Board of Directors. He shall sign all written contracts and obligations of the Club and shall perform such other duties as the Board of Directors may assign, or are usually incumbent upon, a presiding officer.
2. It shall be the duty of the Vice-President to assist the President in the discharge of his duties and, in his absence, to officiate in his stead. He shall also serve as General Chairman of Tournament Committees.
3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to assist the President and Vice-President in the discharge of their duties and, in their absence, to officiate in their stead. It shall also be the duty of the Secretary to attend all meetings of the Club and the Board of Directors; to record the minutes of all such meetings and furnish a copy of such minutes to the board members within ten (10) days after each meeting; and to notify, in writing, new members of their election within five (5) days of their approval by the Board. A copy of this notification will be sent to the Treasurer. He shall also notify board members of the time and place of the next Board meeting.
4. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to bill and collect all monies due to the Club, pay all bills approved by the Board of Directors or certified by the duly authorized representatives of the Club. He shall render monthly financial reports to the Board of Directors and also a financial report to the annual meeting. He shall keep appropriate books of account, and such accounts shall be subject to annual audits. He shall discharge such other duties as may be prescribed by the Board of Directors.
5. The Assistant Secretary shall assist the Secretary in his duties, and shall, in the absence of the Secretary, act in his stead.

## ARTICLE V

### Membership

1. No person under 21 years of age can be a member of the Club.
2. Every member of the club shall be elected by the Board of Directors. The application forms of persons proposed for membership and the

members proposing them shall be kept by the Secretary. The name must be vouched for by at least two members of the Club. To be eligible for resident membership a person shall have resided in Savannah, or within 50 miles thereof, for at least six months immediately prior to his election. There shall be no period of residence required for a former member of the Club who resigned while in good standing.

3. If a person proposed for membership is known by three (3) or more Board Members present at the Board meeting where the person is considered, the Board may vote whether to post the person's name in the monthly bulletin.
4. The name of each candidate posted in the monthly bulletin may be voted on for membership at the next Board meeting. Each name will be voted on in order of the receipt of the complete nomination.
5. The vote on the election of members by the Board of Directors shall be by ballot, and two negative votes shall exclude the person proposed for membership. The name of any person rejected shall not be proposed again within six (6) months from the date of his rejection.
6. When the club has reached maximum membership, applications will be processed by the board according to established procedures. A waiting

list of approved applicants, not more than 10% of the membership, will be maintained by the secretary. As openings become available, invitations to join the club will be mailed.

7. Non-resident: Persons residing fifty (50) miles from the corporate limits of the City of Savannah and spending less than two months of any one year in the area may be non-resident members.
8. Honorary: Members of the Club who have served the Club with distinction and whom the Club may wish to honor may be designated as Honorary Members by the Board of Directors. Such members shall not be required to pay dues.
9. Military: Officers of the United States Armed Services stationed in Savannah or its vicinity may be admitted to the privileges of the Club during the period of their stay. They will be exempt from initiation fee, but shall pay dues. They shall be proposed and balloted as for any member.
10. Any member who is called to active service in the Armed Forces of the United States and moves more than fifty (50) miles from the corporate limits of the City of Savannah shall, during such service, remain on the active roll of the Club and during such service have his dues waived for a period not to exceed five (5) years.
11. The initiation fee for resident and non-resident members shall be \$300. There will be a reduced initiation fee of \$150 for members who resign in good standing.

## ARTICLE VI

### Dues

1. The treasurer will send all members a bill for annual dues by December 10th to be payable by January 10th. A second notice will be electronically delivered to all delinquent members by January 15th to be payable by February 1st. All unpaid members as of February 2nd will be dropped from the membership.
2. The annual dues for the Club shall be \$400 for resident members and \$300 for non-resident members effective Jan. 1, 2023. Thereafter, the Board, at its discretion, shall assess an annual cost of living adjustment to become effective January 1st of each fiscal year.
3. Any tax on dues, initiation fees or assessments shall be paid by the members.
4. Only members in good standing after February 10th will receive a fishing magazine.
5. New members' dues paid after September 1st will be applied to the following year.
6. The Secretary and Treasurer shall be exempt from annual dues. An Assistant Secretary shall not be exempt from dues.

## ARTICLE VII

### Resignations

All resignations shall be in writing, addressed to the Secretary of the Club, and the Board of Directors is authorized to accept such resignations provided the member has discharged all of his indebtedness to the Club.

## ARTICLE VIII

### Alterations of Bylaws

The Bylaws may be altered at any general meeting by 2/3 affirmative vote of the members present at such meetings.

## ARTICLE IX

### Rules

1. Members shall be responsible to the Club for any debt, damage or breakage caused by them or their visitors.
2. The Club will exercise normal precautions to safeguard personal property but assumes no responsibility.
3. Members are requested to bring infractions of the laws and rules of the Club to the attention of the Board of Directors.
4. Guests: Any member, or wife of a member, may invite to the Club at any time during Club functions, non-residents or non-member residents of Chatham County, provided they are accompanied by the member.
5. Trophies: All perpetual trophies shall remain in the custody of the Club.

## ARTICLE X

### Committees

1. There shall be the following Standing Committees: Tournament Committee; Trophy Committee; Program Committee; Tournament Rules Committee; "What's Biting" Committee: Editor to serve as Assistant Secretary.
2. Chairmen of these committees are appointed by the President with the approval of the Board of Directors. These chairmen may or may not be members of the Board.

## SAVANNAH SPORT FISHING CLUB COMMITTEE RESPONSIBILITIES

### AWARDS

- Procure awards for timely presentation at general membership meetings in accordance with "Tournament Procedures and Rules," Section I - Awards.
- Work jointly with the various tournament committee chairmen in obtaining information necessary for supplying awards.
- Arrange for the proper care of trophies displayed in the trophy case.

### COMMUNICATIONS

Design, produce and coordinate the distribution or presentation of the following materials on a timely basis and in accordance with Board policy:

1. "What's Biting" Newsletter  
To be distributed within ten (10) days following each monthly Board meeting. To contain membership proposals, new record fish awards, notice of general membership meetings and programs, tournament notices, promotion and other items of interest.
2. Minutes of Board and General Membership Meetings  
To be distributed to the Board within ten (10) days after meeting.
3. Board Meeting Notification  
Board members are to be notified of date and location of Board meetings ten (10) days prior to meeting.
4. Printed Materials  
Maintain letterhead and envelopes, and coordinate production of other necessary supplies and forms.
5. Mailings/Printing  
Supply updated mailing list and coordinate mailings with printer.

### COOKING CREW

Coordinate with members of the Board on events requiring cooking which typically include the Oyster Roast, Shakedown, Blue Water, Young Anglers and Inshore. Duties include organizing a committee to plan and cook meals, oversee the stocking and maintenance of the Club Cooking Trailer, ensuring equipment is cleaned and stored after use.

### FINANCE

- Plan, budget, review and manage the financial operations of the Club.
- Insure that financial documentation is kept in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.
- Keep the Board and general membership abreast of the Club's financial condition.

### FUND RAISING

Coordinate committee to solicit, invoice and collect contributions from sponsors for advertising in the Club Handbook, Bluewater Tournament Program and specific tournament events.

## GAMEFISH RECORDS

- Maintain a supply of record fish and billfish registry application forms and provide appropriate methods of member access to them.
- Evaluate record fish applications.
- Maintain the Club's record fish and billfish statistics.
- Provide new record fish data to the General Tournament Committee Chairman for credit toward annual awards and to the Communications Committee Chairman for recognition in the "What's Biting" newsletter and the Club handbook.
- Provide certificates for new records and new billfish registry and forward to the President for presentation to the recipients.
- Provide new record fish and billfish registry data to the Chairman of the Awards Committee by November 1 of each year so that appropriate awards may be given at the annual meeting.

## GENERAL TOURNAMENTS

Organize tournaments within Tournaments, including: communication via Secretary, gather General Tournament Score Sheets from Weigh-In Chairman, calculate General Tournament and Annual Award winners, provide information to Secretary for communication and to Awards Chairman for trophy order and organize and present trophies at various meetings.

## HANDBOOK

Design, produce and distribute the handbook annually prior to the first Club tournament.

## LONG RANGE PLANNING

Coordinate a committee to provide the Board with a list of long range objectives.

## NOMINATING

- Select and propose to the membership candidates to fill four expiring directorships annually (Bylaws Article II (4)).
- Select and propose to the newly elected Board, candidates for Officers for the new year.

## PROGRAMS/EDUCATION

- Arrange for programs, presentations and activities at general membership meetings that promote angling participation and education.
- Provide for a sharing of ideas and experiences among members.
- Arrange for audio-visual equipment or other necessary accommodations as needed.

## WEIGH-IN

Coordinate network of volunteers who handle, weigh and score all of the fish caught during the Club's General and Special Tournaments. Score sheets are then forwarded to the General Tournaments Chairman.

## TOURNAMENT COMMITTEES

(The Club Vice-President shall be the General Chairman.)

- Oversee and coordinate the activities of all Tournament Committees. The Vice-President shall be ex-officio member of each Tournament Committee.
- Recommend, for Board consideration at the first scheduled Board meeting of the year, dates for all tournaments during the season.
- Provide finalized schedule and other tournament information to the Communications Committee Chairman for publication.
- Maintain “general” tournament procedures and rules that encourage member participation, sportsmanship, and safety.
- Advise the Board on emerging issues or problems that may warrant rules changes; propose solutions to these problems.
- Insure that all tournaments classified as “General Tournaments” are served by these rules.
- The Tournament Committee Chairman will prepare and present for approval by the Board of Directors a budget outlining all projected income and expenses for a particular tournament. The budget must be presented to the Board for approval a minimum of two Board meetings prior to the tournament date.

## TOURNAMENT RULES AND PROCEDURES

- The Tournament Committee Chairman will prepare and present for approval by the Board of Directors an outline of all tournament rules and procedures to be used in a tournament. They shall be modeled after the “GENERAL TOURNAMENT RULES AND PROCEDURES” and modified as necessary to coincide with the particular tournament.
- All tournament rules and procedures must include the following provisions:
  1. A General Tournament will be automatically cancelled for Areas A, B & C if at **1800 (6PM)** the evening before the fish day there is a “small craft advisory” forecast for “any time” the following tournament day out to 60 nautical miles from the Savannah River, GA to Altamaha Sound, GA. Area I will still fish.  
*“Tournament Day” is not the same as “Tournament Date.” “Tournament Day” does not include the “PM night” of the Tournament Date but does include “AM Night/Morning” of the tournament date. Offshore divisions will not be canceled if a small craft advisory is only included in the forecast for “Saturday Night” but is not included in any of the weather forecasts of any earlier segments of the tournament date.*
  2. Any protests initiated by tournament participants against the Tournament Committee will be referred to, and resolved by, the Executive Committee of the Savannah Sport Fishing Club.
  3. Submission of an illegal fish will disqualify the boat and all anglers on that boat for that tournament.
  4. Tournament rules and procedures must be presented to the Board for approval a minimum of two Board meetings prior to the tournament date.
  5. It is the responsibility of the Captain and each angler to comply with all State and Federal (NOAA) regulations applicable on the fish date of any fishing tournament sponsored by the Savannah Sport Fishing Club.

### AUTHORITY OF THE TOURNAMENT COMMITTEES

Upon approval by the Board of Directors, any subsequent changes or variations to the tournament rules and procedures referenced above will not be allowed without prior approval by the Board.

### INDIVIDUAL TOURNAMENT COMMITTEE RESPONSIBILITIES

- General, Shakedown, Blue Water, Inshore, Powder Puff and Young Anglers Tournaments
- Organize and manage tournaments in accordance with “Tournament Procedures and Rules” and with Board policy.
- Recommend, at the first Board meeting of the year, a date for the tournament that best serves the Club’s interests.

- Recommend, for Board consideration, tournament rules including weigh-in arrangements and awards to be presented.
- Maintain itemized records of income and expenses for the Finance Committee review and records.
- Supply tournament promotion and results information to the Communications Committee and the Awards Committee Chairmen.

## PROCEDURES AND RULES FOR GENERAL TOURNAMENTS

### A. COMMITTEE FUNCTIONS

1. Promotion - The Committee will promote each tournament. Notification will be sent to the membership which shall contain necessary information on the tournament.
2. Exceptions - Items not specifically provided for in these rules will be subject to the jurisdiction of the Committee and all Committee decisions will be final.

### B. TOURNAMENT PARTICIPANTS

1. Persons Eligible - Club members, their spouses, dependent children, and guests.
2. Vessels Eligible - Any vessel. A vessel must have a SSFC member on board. A vessel is the same as a boat.
3. Club Member Spouses and Dependent Children may fish as Club Members

### C. TOURNAMENT DURATION

Fishing Hours - Fishing hours start 30 minutes before sunrise, stop as necessary to be at the Savannah Yacht Club weigh-in dock to comply with weigh-in hours.

### D. TOURNAMENT CATEGORIES

Areas - Four distinct areas of competition shall be available during each tournament. Any body of water that is posted as closed and/or is closed to public fishing is excluded from all areas.

- Area I - Inshore waters out to the US COLREGS Demarcation Lines. Also included in Area I are areas such as the front of Cabbage Island, Little and Big Slough in Ossabaw, Williamson Slough, Tybee Slough and any other inshore location which does not front the ocean.
- Area A - 70 feet of water or less. Area A is defined as fishing on any land mass which fronts the ocean, or in the ocean in a boat in up to 70 feet of water.
- Area B - 71-160 feet of water.
- Area C - 161 feet of water or greater.

#### E. TOURNAMENT ANGLING PROCEDURES

1. Standard - International Angling Rules will govern.
2. Exception - Metal lines and treble hooks may be used.
3. Release - A release is considered valid if a crew member or angler touches the leader with their hand. The intention of releasing the fish must be made by the angler before the actual release.

#### F. TOURNAMENT COCKPIT PROCEDURES

1. Rods - No limit on rods fished.
2. Rod Assignments - Rods must be fished equitably by all anglers as determined by skipper.
3. Interference - Boat may display a square red flag when fighting a fish. Other boats must then stay clear. Offending vessels, if causing a cut-off, will be disqualified from the tournament.

#### G. TOURNAMENT WEIGH-IN PROCEDURES

1. Weigh Station - Savannah Yacht Club.
2. Hours – 1730-1900.
3. Exception - Vessels who are aiding a vessel in distress may petition the Committee Boat for a delayed weigh-in.
4. Skipper - The skipper is responsible for his anglers.
5. Anglers-The angler must provide an effective method of identifying his catch and verify its accurate recording.
6. Areas - The weighmaster must be informed of the area fished. This is determined by the deepest depth fished, and not by where the fish was/were caught.
7. Official Scoring can be found on page number 147. Weigh-in by car is permitted.

#### H. TOURNAMENT SCORING

(Two separate point systems shall be maintained. One, by area, for tournament competition, and another for Annual “Championship” competition).

## 1. Tournament Competition Scoring

- a. Anglers - Points shall be awarded, as indicated on the official sheet, for various species of fish weighed-in, tagged or released. A maximum of ten (10) fish may be weighed in by each angler. However, only five fish comprised of trout, bass and flounder may be weighed in for the Inshore category (2 of which may be bass).
- b. Young Anglers - The entire scoresheet is open to Young Anglers. There is no limitation to the number of species weighed in for the Inshore Category. A maximum of (10) fish may be weighed in by each Young Angler for all areas. Young Anglers compete against other Young Anglers for Tournament and Championship Scoring Points. The Young Angler accruing the most Championship Points will be eligible for the Woody Woodward Young Angler of the Year award. Young Anglers may compete in the Adult Division and their fish included in the boat weight, but all Angler Tournament Scoring Rules (Section H.1.a) above will apply.
- c. Boats - Same as (a), maximum of five (5) may be weighed in for the boat for Inshore category and ten (10) fish may be weighed in for other categories
- d. Winners – Winning anglers and boats will be determined by their total points in the tournament.
- e. Ties - In the event of a total weight tie; earliest weigh in time will be employed to break the tie.

## 2. Annual “Championship” Competition Scoring

- a. Anglers and Boats - Points shall be accrued based on records from each tournament as follows:
  - Each tournament first place - 10 points.
  - Each tournament second place - 8 points.
  - Each tournament third place - 6 points.
  - Each tournament fourth place - 4 points.
  - Each check-in at weigh station - 3 points.
- b. Winners - Winning anglers and boats will be determined by the total number of points accrued in their best four (4) tournament finishes of the scheduled general tournaments. The club will recognize 1st, 2nd & 3rd place anglers and boats for each area.
- c. In the event of an Annual Championship Tie, the “Cumulative Total Points of the best four (4) general tournament finishes will be employed to break the tie. “Cumulative Total Points” is defined as total weight and/or release points for the top four tournaments, added together. In the event that this is also a tie, the winner will then be determined by boat or angler having the earliest first place finish in a general tournament.

- d. Exceptions - Only members, their spouses, dependent children, and member vessels may accrue "Championship" points.
- e. If a member owns multiple vessels, each vessel shall weigh in under a unique name and accrue Championship Points individually.
- f. Fish not caught from the vessel shall be eligible for angler points only.
- g. If a member purchases a replacement vessel during the season, any Championship Points earned by the replacement vessel will be added to the points already earned by the member's original vessel.
- h. "Substitution" vessels may not accrue Championship Points for a member's vessel unless a member petitions for and receives approval from the Vice President or Board designee prior the tournament only in the event of a mechanical breakdown.

## I. AWARDS

- 1. Official Tournaments - Each of the four fishing areas (I, A, B, C) may have first, second and third place boat and first, second and third place angler awards - providing an eligible fish is weighed-in by each respective boat and angler.
- 2. Annual "Championship" Awards - There will be first through third place angler awards, and first through third place boat awards. The Club perpetual trophies will be awarded for the first angler and first boat, regardless of areas fished during the season. There will be separate angler and boat awards for the Inshore (Areas I, A, B, & C will each be a separate area of competition for both individual General Tournaments & Year End Standings)  
Special Awards - In the opinion of the Committee, should there be an outstanding catch, a special award will be presented.

## J. SPECIAL RULES FOR POWDER PUFF TOURNAMENT

The Powder Puff Tournament follows the format of the General Tournament procedures and rules with these exceptions:

- 1. When a fish strikes the rod may be removed from the rod holder and handed to the lady angler.
- 2. The overall winners of the Powder Puff Tournament (winners of the Rosalind Demere Trophy) are determined by the highest individual lady angler score in each area.
- 3. Final decision of these rules and any others in the Powder Puff Tournament is up to the Powder Puff Tournament Committee.

K. SPECIAL RULES FOR AREA C

Billfish will be scored as follows:

Blue Marlin – 300 Points

White Marlin - 200 Points

Sailfish - 100 Points

Unidentifiable Billfish will be scored as Sailfish

Mandatory Hook requirements:

Non-offset Circle Hooks are mandatory when deploying any dead or live natural baits. “J” hooks are allowed on artificial lures only.

Any Boat that fishes Area C shall use Circle Hooks when deploying any dead or live natural baits for its entire fish day, including if the boat moves to or from shallower water areas such as A and /or B.

## **INTERNATIONAL ANGLING RULES**

The following angling rules have been formulated by the International Game Fish Association to promote ethical and sporting angling practices, to establish uniform regulations for the compilation of world game fish records, and to provide basic angling guidelines for use in fishing tournaments and any other group angling activities.

The word “angling” is defined as catching or attempting to catch fish with a rod, reel, line, and hook as outlined in the international angling rules. There are some aspects of angling that cannot be controlled through rule making, however. Angling regulations cannot insure an outstanding performance from each fish, and world records cannot indicate the amount of difficulty in catching the fish. Captures in which the fish has not fought or has not had a chance to fight do not reflect credit on the fisherman, and only the angler can properly evaluate the degree of achievement in establishing the record. Only fish caught in accordance with IGFA international angling rules, and within the intent of these rules, will be considered for world records. Following are the rules for freshwater and saltwater fishing and a separate set of rules for All-Tackle Length and Flyfishing.

### **RULES FOR FISHING IN FRESH AND SALT WATER**

*(Also see Rules for All-Tackle Length and Rules for Flyfishing)*

#### **EQUIPMENT REGULATIONS**

##### **A. LINE & BACKING**

1. Monofilament, multifilament, and lead core multifilament lines may be used. For line classes, see World Record Requirements.
2. Wire lines are prohibited.
3. The use of backing is permissible.
4. The catch shall be classified under the breaking strength of the first 16.5 feet (5 meters) of line directly preceding the double line, leader, or hook. This section must be comprised of a single, homogenous piece of line.

##### **B. DOUBLE LINE**

The use of a double line is not required. If one is used, it must meet the following specifications:

1. A double line must consist of the actual line used to catch the fish.
2. Double lines are measured from the start of the knot, braid, roll or splice making the double to the farthestmost end of the knot, splice, snap, swivel or other device used for securing the trace, leader, lure or hook to the double line.

Saltwater species: In all line classes up to and including 20 lb (10 kg), the double line shall be limited to 15 feet (4.57 meters). The combined length of the double line and leader shall not exceed 20 feet (6.1 meters).

The double line on all classes of tackle over 20 lb (10 kg) shall be limited to 30 feet (9.14 meters). The combined length of the double line and leader shall not exceed 40 feet (12.19 meters).

Freshwater species: The double line on all classes of tackle shall not exceed 6 feet (1.82 meters). The combined length of the double line and the leader shall not exceed 10 feet (3.04 meters).

### **C. LEADER**

The use of a leader is not required. If one is used, it must meet the following specifications:

The length of the leader is the overall length including any lure, hook arrangement or other device, and is measured to the bend of the last hook. The leader must be connected to the line with a snap, knot, splice, swivel or other device. Holding devices are prohibited. There are no regulations regarding the material or strength of the leader.

Saltwater species: In all line classes up to and including 20 lb (10 kg), the leader shall be limited to 15 feet (4.57 meters). The combined length of the double line and leader shall not exceed 20 feet (6.1 meters).

The leader on all classes of tackle over 20 lb (10 kg) shall be limited to 30 feet (9.14 meters). The combined length of the double line and leader shall be limited to 40 feet (12.19 meters).

Freshwater species: The leader on all classes of tackle shall be limited to 6 feet (1.82 meters). The combined length of the double line and leader shall not exceed 10 feet (3.04 meters).

### **D. ROD**

1. Rods must comply with sporting ethics and customs. Considerable latitude is allowed in the choice of a rod, but rods giving the angler an unfair advantage will be disqualified. This rule is intended to eliminate the use of unconventional rods.
2. The rod tip must be a minimum of 40 inches (101.6 cm) in length. The rod butt cannot exceed 27 inches (68.58 cm) in length. These measurements must be made from a point directly beneath the center of the reel. A curved butt is measured in a straight line. When the rod butt is placed in a gimbal, the measurement from the center of the reel seat to the pivot point of the gimbal can be no more than 27 inches. (The above measurements do not apply to surfcasting rods.)

### **E. REEL**

1. Reels must comply with sporting ethics and customs.
2. Power-driven reels are acceptable under the following situation and configuration.
  - a) Reels that have power accessories (e.g., electric drill attachments, motors, or other power accessories specifically designed for a reel) that can be physically removed from the reel may be used strictly for the purpose of retrieving a deployed bait or lure at depth all the way to the boat.
  - b) Power accessories may only be used to retrieve a bait or lure completely to the boat and are not permitted for adjusting the position of a bait or lure in the water column. Once a power accessory is attached to the reel, the bait or lure may no longer be legally used to catch a fish and the bait or lure must be retrieved all the way to the boat for manual redeployment before it may be legally used to hook or catch a fish. Power accessories may not be attached to the reel during the deployment of a bait or lure.
  - c) Power accessories must be physically removed from the reel before the act of or hooking or fighting a fish. Any fish that strikes a bait or lure being fished with a reel with power accessories still attached—whether or not under electric

operation→ will not be eligible for record consideration.

- d) Electric reels that do not have removable electronic components that allow them to be completely manually driven are prohibited
3. Ratchet handle reels are prohibited.
4. Reels designed to be cranked with both hands at the same time are prohibited.

## **F. HOOKS FOR BAIT FISHING**

1. For live or dead bait fishing no more than two single hooks may be used. Both must be firmly imbedded in or securely attached to the bait. The eyes of the hooks must be no less than a hook's length (the length of the largest hook used) apart and no more than 18 inches (45.72 cm) apart. The only exception is that the point of one hook may be passed through the eye of the other hook. A hook may not precede bait, lure or bait/lure combo by more than one hook's length.
2. The use of a dangling or swinging hook is prohibited. Double or treble hooks are prohibited.
3. A two hook rig for bottom fishing is acceptable if it consists of two single hooks on separate leaders or drops. Both hooks must be imbedded in the respective baits and separated sufficiently so that a fish caught on one hook cannot be foul hooked by the other.
4. A photograph or sketch of the hook arrangement must accompany all record applications made for fish caught on two-hook tackle.

## **G. HOOKS & LURES**

1. When using an artificial lure with a skirt or trailing material, no more than two single hooks may be attached to the line, leader, or trace. The hooks need not be attached separately. The eyes of the hooks must be no less than an overall hook's length (the overall length of the largest hook used) apart and no more than 30.48 centimeters (12 inches) apart. The only exception is that the point of one hook may be passed through the eye of the other hook. The trailing hook may not extend more than a hook's length beyond the skirt of the lure. A hook may not precede bait, lure or bait/lure combo by more than one hook's length. A photograph or sketch showing the hook arrangement must accompany a record application.
2. Gang hooks are permitted when attached to plugs and other artificial lures that are specifically designed for this use. Gang hooks must be free swinging and shall be limited to a maximum of three hooks (single, double, or treble, or a combination of any three). It is permissible to imbed or securely attach a gang hook to a lure provided that the hook becomes free swinging once the fish takes the lure. Gang hooks may not be used with live or dead baits. A photograph or sketch of the plug or lure should be submitted with record applications.
3. Assist hooks or other such single hooks that are attached to a lure with a lead constructed of monofilament, multifilament, wire or other such material must conform to the following: When using assist hooks on any artificial lure, other than a skirted lure, the lead cannot be more than 1 ½ hook's length and the bend of the hook may not be more than 10.1 centimeters (4 inches), whichever is less, from the closest point of attachment on the lure. Double and treble hooks may not be used as assist hooks.
4. Only one lure containing hooks may be used at a time.

## H. OTHER EQUIPMENT

1. Fighting chairs may not have any mechanically propelled devices that aid the angler in fighting a fish.
2. Gimbals must be free swinging, which includes gimbals that swing in a vertical plane only. Any gimbal that allows the angler to reduce strain or to rest while fighting the fish is prohibited.
3. Gaffs (including flying gaffs) and nets used to boat or land a fish must not exceed 2.44 meters (8 feet) in overall length. In using a flying or detachable gaff, the rope may not exceed 9.14 meters (30 feet). The gaff rope must be measured from the point where it is secured to the detachable head to the other end. Only the effective length will be considered. If a fixed head gaff is used, the same limitations shall apply and the gaff rope shall be measured from the same location on the gaff hook. Only a single hook is permitted on any gaff. Harpoons or lances are prohibited. Tail ropes are limited to 9.14 meters (30 feet). When fishing from a bridge, pier, or other high platform or structure, this length limitation does not apply.
3. Entangling devices, either with or without a hook, are prohibited and may not be used for any purpose including baiting, hooking, fighting, or landing the fish.
4. Outriggers, downriggers, spreader bars and kites are permitted to be used provided that the actual fishing line is attached to the snap or other release device, either directly or with some other material. The leader or double line may not be connected to the release mechanism either directly or with the use of a connecting device. Spreader bars are also acceptable when used strictly as a teaser.
5. Daisy chains, birds, floats and similar devices may only be used if they do not unfairly hamper or inhibit the normal swimming or fighting ability of the fish, thereby giving the angler or crew an unfair advantage in fighting, landing or boating the fish.

6. A safety line may be attached to the rod, reel or harness provided that it does not in any way assist the angler in fighting the fish.

## **ANGLING REGULATIONS**

1. From the time that a fish strikes or takes a bait or lure, the angler must hook, fight, and land or boat the fish without the aid of any other person, except as provided in these regulations.
2. If a rod holder is used, once the fish is hooked, the angler must remove the rod from the rod holder as quickly as possible.
3. In the event of a multiple strike on separate lines being fished by a single angler, only the first fish fought by the angler will be considered for a world record.
4. If a double line is used, the intent of the regulations is that the fish will be fought on the single line most of the time that it takes to land the fish.
5. Use of a rod belt or waist gimbal is permitted.
6. When angling from a boat, once the leader is brought within the grasp of the mate, or the end of the leader is wound to the rod tip, more than one person is permitted to hold the leader. Anyone assisting a shore-bound or wading angler must be within a rods length of the angler before touching the leader or netting or gaffing the fish.
7. One or more gaffers may be used in addition to persons holding the leader. The gaff handle must be in hand when the fish is gaffed.
8. The angling and equipment regulations shall apply until the fish is weighed.

### ***The following acts will disqualify a catch:***

1. Failure to comply with equipment or angling regulations.
2. The act of persons other than the angler in touching any part of the rod, reel, or line (including the double line) either bodily or with any device, from the time a fish strikes or takes the bait or lure, until the fish is either landed or released, or in giving any aid other than that allowed in the rules and regulations. If an obstacle to the passage of the line through the rod guides has to be removed from the line, then the obstacle (whether chum, floatline, rubber band, or other material) shall be held and cut free. Under no circumstances should the line be held or touched by anyone other than the angler during this process.
3. Resting the rod in a rod holder, on the gunwale of the boat, or any other object while playing the fish.
4. Handlining or using a handline or rope attached in any manner to the angler's line or leader for the purpose of holding or lifting the fish.
5. Shooting, harpooning, or lancing any fish (including sharks and halibuts) at any stage of the catch.
6. Chumming with or using as bait the flesh, blood, skin, or any part of mammals other than hair or pork rind used in lures designed for trolling or casting.
7. Using a boat or device to beach or drive a fish into shallow water in order to deprive the fish of its normal ability to swim.
8. Changing the rod or reel while the fish is being played.
9. Splicing, removing, or adding to the line while the fish is being played.
10. Intentionally foul hooking a fish.
11. Catching a fish in a manner that the double line never leaves the rod tip.
12. Using a size or kind of bait that is illegal to possess.
13. Attaching the angler's line or leader to part of a boat or other object for the

- purpose of holding or lifting the fish.
14. If a fish escapes before gaffing or netting and is recaptured by any method other than as outlined in the angling rules.
  15. Holding or touching an angler in a manner that assists them in fighting the fish or takes pressure off of the angler. Touching or briefly holding the angler to prevent them from falling does not constitute a disqualification.

# ILLUSTRATED GUIDE TO EQUIPMENT REGULATIONS

## Double Lines and Leaders



Double lines are measured from the start of the knot, braid, roll or splice making the double line to the farthestmost end of the knot, splice, snap, swivel or other device used for securing the trace, leader lure or hook to the double line. A double line must consist of the actual line used to catch the fish. For saltwater species, the double line shall be limited to 15 feet (4.57 meters) for all line classes up to and including 20 lb (10 kg); and shall be limited to 30 feet (9.14 meters) for line classes over 20 lb (10 kg). For freshwater species, the double line on all classes of tackle shall not exceed 6 feet (1.82 meters).



The leader shall be limited to 15 feet (4.57 meters) for saltwater species in line classes up to and including 20 lb (10 kg), and 30 feet (9.14 meters) for all line classes over 20 lb (10 kg). For fresh water species, the leader on all classes of tackle shall be limited to 6 feet (1.82 meters).



The length of the leader is the overall length including any lure, hook arrangements or other device.



The combined length of the double line and leader shall not exceed 20 ft (6.1 meters) in line classes up to and including 20 lb (10 kg) and 40 feet (12.19 meters) in line classes over 20 lb (10 kg) for saltwater species. The combined length of the double line and leader shall not exceed 10 feet (3.04 meters) for freshwater species.



# ILLUSTRATED GUIDE TO HOOK REGULATIONS

## *Natural Baits and Artificial*



**LEGAL** if eyes of hooks no more than 18 inches(45.72cm) apart in baits and no more than 12 inches(30.45cm) apart in lures. **ILLEGAL** if eyes further apart than these distances.



**LEGAL** as eyes of hooks are no less than a hook's length apart and no more than 12 inches(30.45 cm) apart, and the trailing hook does not extend more than a hook's length beyond the skirt.



**NOT LEGAL** as the second or trailing hook extends more than the hook's length beyond skirt. See also two hook rigs.



**LEGAL** as hook is contained within the skirt.



**NOT LEGAL** in bait or lures as eyes of hooks are less than a hook's length (the length of the largest hook) apart.



**NOT LEGAL** as the single hook extends more than its length beyond the skirt.



**LEGAL** as eyes of hooks are no less than a hook's length apart and no more than 18 inches (45.72 cm) in baits and 12 inches (30.45 cm) in lures.



**NOT LEGAL** as back hook is not firmly imbedded in or securely attached to bait and is a dangling or swinging hook.



**LEGAL** in baits and lures. The point of one hook is passed through the eye of the other hook



**LEGAL** as both hooks are firmly imbedded or securely attached to bait. Would not be legal if eyes of hooks were more than 18 inches (45.72 cm) apart

### GAFFS



**Flying Gaffs - LEGAL** on boats if effective rope length does not exceed 30 feet (9.15 meters).



**Fixed Gaffs - LEGAL** on boats if overall gaff length does not exceed 8 feet (2.44 meters).



# ILLUSTRATED GUIDE TO HOOK REGULATIONS

## Assist Hooks

Assist hooks are hooks that are attached to lures with leads typically constructed of multifilament, wire, monofilament or other similar material. Assist hooks have become wildly popular with vertical jigs and are also being increasingly used with plugs in place of traditional treble hooks.

*Assist hooks or other such single hooks that are attached to a lure with a lead constructed of monofilament, multifilament, wire or other such material must conform to the following: When using assist hooks on any artificial lure, other than a skirted lure, the lead cannot be more than 1 1/2 hook's length and the bend of the hook may not be more than 101 millimeters (4 inches), whichever is less, from the closest point of attachment on the lure. Double and treble hooks may not be used as assist hooks.*



**IGFA COMPLIANT:**  
With this assist hook, the lead is within 1 1/2 hook's length (measured from the closest point of attachment on the lure to the eye of the hook).

Multiple assist hooks are allowed.  
Double and treble hooks may not be used as assist hooks.

Assist hook (or hooks) can be attached to either end of the lure.

With this assist hook, the bend of the hook is more than 101 millimeters (4 inches) from the closest point of attachment on the lure.

ie: 107 millimeters (4.25 inches) > 101 millimeters (4 inches)

## **INTERNATIONAL FLYFISHING RULES**


### **EQUIPMENT REGULATIONS**

#### **A. LINE**

Any type of fly line and backing may be used. The breaking strength of the fly line and backing are not restricted.

#### **B. LEADER**

Leaders must conform to generally accepted fly fishing customs. A leader includes a class tippet and, optionally, a shock tippet. A butt or taper section between the fly line and the class tippet shall also be considered part of the leader and there are no limits on its length, material, or strength. A class tippet must be made of nonmetallic material and either attached directly to the fly or to the shock tippet if one is used. The class tippet must be at least 15 inches (38.10 cm) long (measured inside connecting knots). With respect to knotless, tapered leaders, the terminal 15 inches (38.10 cm) will also determine tippet class. There is no maximum length limitation. A shock tippet, not to exceed 12 inches (30.48 cm) in length, may be added to the class tippet and tied to the lure. It can be made of any type of material, and there is no limit on its breaking strength. The shock tippet is measured from the eye of the hook to the single strand of class tippet and includes any knots used to connect the shock tippet to the class tippet. In the case of a tandem hook fly, the shock tippet shall be measured from the eye of the leading hook.



#### **C. ROD**

Regardless of material used or number of sections, rods must conform and cast according to generally accepted fly fishing customs and practices. A rod shall not measure less than 6 feet (1.82 m) in overall length and any rod that gives the angler an unsporting advantage will be disqualified. Overall butt length may not exceed six inches when measured from the center of the reel foot to the end of the butt. Overall butt length for two-handed or spey rods longer than 11 feet may not exceed 10 inches when measured from the center of the reel foot to the end of the butt.

#### **D. REEL**

The reel must be designed expressly for fly fishing. There are no restrictions on gear ratio or type of drag employed except where the angler would gain an unfair advantage. Electric or electronically operated reels are prohibited.

#### **E. HOOKS**

A conventional fly may be dressed on a single or double hook or two single hooks in tandem. The second hook in any tandem fly must not extend beyond the wing material. The eyes of the hooks shall be no farther than 6 inches (15.24 cm) apart. Treble hooks are prohibited.

## **F. FLIES**

The fly must be a recognized type of artificial fly, which includes streamer, bucktail, tube fly, wet fly, dry fly, nymph, popper and bug. The use of any other type of lure or natural or preserved bait, either singularly or attached to the fly, is expressly prohibited. The fact that a fly can be cast with a fly rod is not evidence in itself that it fits the definition of a fly. The use of any fly designed to entangle or foul hook a fish is prohibited. No scent, either natural or artificial is allowed on flies. The use of scented material in a fly is prohibited.

Only a single fly is allowed with the exception of dropper flies that may be used only in the circumstances described below.

Dropper flies are permissible only for fishing for Salmonid species (e.g., trout, grayling, salmon, etc.) under the following configuration:

1. Dropper flies may consist of no more than two flies fished in tandem that are surface flies, subsurface flies or a combination of the two.
2. The material connecting the two flies must be equal to or less than the breaking strength of the class tippet material connecting the lead fly to the fly leader.
3. Catches will be categorized by the breaking strength of the class tippet preceding the lead fly, no matter which fly the fish is caught on.

## **G. GAFFS & NETS**

Gaffs and nets used to boat or land a fish must not exceed 8 feet (2.44 meters) in overall length. (When fishing from a bridge, pier or other high stationary structure, this length limitation does not apply.) The use of a flying gaff is not permitted. Only a single hook is permitted on any gaff. Harpoon or lance attachments are prohibited. A rope or any extension cannot be attached to the gaff.

## **ANGLING REGULATIONS**

1. The angler must cast, hook, fight, and bring the fish to gaff or net unaided by any other person. No other person may touch any part of the tackle during the playing of the fish or give aid other than taking the leader for gaffing or netting purposes. Anyone assisting a shore-bound or wading angler must be within a rods length of the angler before touching the leader or netting or gaffing the fish.
2. Casting and retrieving must be carried out in accordance with normal customs and generally accepted practices. The major criterion in casting is that the weight of the line must carry the fly rather than the weight of the fly carrying the line. Trolling a fly behind a moving water craft is not permitted. The craft must be completely out of gear both at the time the fly is presented to the fish and during the retrieve. The maximum amount of line that can be stripped off the reel is 120 feet (36.57 meters) from the fly.
3. Once a fish is hooked, the tackle may not be altered in any way, with the exception of adding an extension butt. A harness cannot be attached to the fly rod.
4. Fish must be hooked on the fly in use. If a small fish takes the fly and a larger fish swallows the smaller fish, the catch will be disallowed.
5. One or more people may assist in gaffing or netting the fish.
6. The angling and equipment regulations shall apply until the fish is weighed.

### ***The Following Acts Will Disqualify a Catch:***

1. Failure to comply with equipment or angling regulations.

2. The act of persons other than the angler in touching any part of the rod, reel, or line either bodily or with any device during the playing of the fish, or in giving any aid other than that allowed in the rules and regulations. If an obstacle to the passage of the line through the rod guides has to be removed from the line, then the obstacle shall be held and cut free. Under no circumstances should the line be held or touched by anyone other than the angler during this process.
3. Resting the rod on any part of the boat, or on any other object while playing the fish.
4. Handlining or using a handline or rope attached in any manner to the angler's line or leader for the purpose of holding or lifting the fish.
5. Intentionally foul hooking or snagging a fish.
6. Shooting, harpooning, or lancing any fish (including sharks and halibut) at any stage of the catch.
7. Chumming with the flesh, blood, skin, or any part of mammals.
8. Using a boat or device to beach or drive a fish into shallow water in order to deprive the fish of its normal ability to swim.
9. Attaching the angler's line or leader to part of a boat or other object for the purpose of holding or lifting the fish. If a fish escapes before gaffing or netting and is recaptured by any method other than as outlined in the angling rules.
10. When a rod breaks (while the fish is being played) in a manner that reduces its length below minimum dimensions or severely impairs its angling characteristics.
11. When a fish is hooked or entangled on more than one line.
12. Mutilation to the fish, prior to landing or boating the catch, caused by sharks, other fish, mammals, or propellers that remove or penetrate the flesh. (Injuries caused by leader or line, scratches, old healed scars or regeneration deformities are not considered to be disqualifying injuries.) Any mutilation on the fish must be shown in a photograph and fully explained in a separate report accompanying the record application.
13. Holding or touching an angler in a manner that assists them in fighting the fish or takes pressure off of the angler. Touching or briefly holding the angler to prevent them from falling does not constitute a disqualification.

## **ALL-TACKLE LENGTH RULES**

### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

All fish entered for Length Records must be measured by anglers at the site of capture and released so that it swims away on their own and in good condition. Fish should be revived by moving it forward in the water to ensure a healthy release. Fish caught and entered for length records are not eligible for weighing and submission for other record categories.

## **RULES AND EQUIPMENT REGULATIONS**

All IGFA rules and equipment regulations stipulated for fishing with conventional and fly tackle in fresh and saltwater shall apply with the exceptions below. All angling and equipment regulations shall apply until the fish is measured and released alive.

### **A. GAFFS & NETS**

1. The use of gaffs to land fish is prohibited.
2. Nets used to boat or land a fish must not exceed 8 feet (2.44 meters) in over all length. (When fishing from a bridge, pier or other high stationary structure, this

length limitation does not apply.)

3. The use of knotless, rubber coated nets or other similarly designed nets that minimize slime and scale removal is strongly recommended.

## **B. MEASURING DEVICE**

1. All fish must be measured using an official IGFA measuring device.
2. The measuring device mat may be shortened by cutting it, but it may not be rejoined after it has been shortened.

## **ANGLING REGULATIONS**

### ***The Following Acts Will Disqualify a Catch:***

1. Failure to comply with IGFA equipment or angling rules.
2. If the fish dies during the documentation process, or does not swim away on its accord after release


## **LENGTH RECORD REQUIREMENTS**

All fish entered for Length Records are subject to the same requirements stipulated for other record categories with following additions and exceptions. Species eligible for All Tackle

Length World Records may be found in the World Record Game Fishes book or online at [www.igfa.org](http://www.igfa.org).

## **A. MEASURING REQUIREMENTS**

1. Fish must be measured using an official IGFA measuring device on a flat surface.
2. The fish's snout must be touching the nose stop and free of lures or lifting devices.
3. With the fish lying on top of the measuring device, measurements will be taken from the most forward part of the fish's snout to the rear center edge of the tail.
4. All measurements will be made in centimeters.
5. Fish that measure between centimeter increments shall be recorded at the lower of the two increments. For example, a fish that measures between 45 and 46 centimeters will have a recorded length of 45 centimeters.



## **B. MINIMUM LENGTH REQUIREMENTS FOR VACANT RECORDS**

Fish entered for vacant record categories must measure within the top half of that species maximum recorded length, as shown in the eligible species list.

## **C. MINIMUM LENGTH REQUIREMENTS NEEDED TO DEFEAT OR TIE EXISTING RECORDS**

1. To defeat an existing record, the fish must measure at least two (2) centimeters longer than the existing record
2. A catch which matches the length of an existing record or exceeds the length

by less than 2 centimeters will be considered a tie. In the case of a tie claim involving more than two catches, length must be compared with the original record (first fish to be caught). Nothing measuring less than the original record (first fish to be caught) will be considered.

#### **D. PHOTOGRAPHIC REQUIREMENTS**

Photographs included with applications must contain the following information.

1. The full length of the fish on the measuring device clearly showing the position of the mouth and tail. The fish may be held in position, but must be done in a manner that does not obscure the view of the fish on the tape.
2. A close up showing the position of the fish's nose and tail on the measuring device.
3. The angler with the fish.
4. The rod and reel used to make the catch.

#### **GENERAL BEST HANDLING PRACTICES**

To remove your fish from the water to document it for record purposes, anglers should use either hands or a knotless, rubberized landing net to minimize slime and scale loss. Lip gripping devices may be used to help subdue fish. However, large fish should not be hoisted vertically out of the water, as this can cause damage to jaw muscle and bone as well as to internal organs. The best method for removing fish from the water by hand is to grip the fish or the lower jaw and support the fish's underside. Again, the point is always to hold fish horizontally and not vertically.

#### **DOCUMENTATION**

IGFA records require pictures, measurement and/or weighing of the catch. All of this takes time, so you should have the necessary equipment ready before landing the fish. If the documentation process takes longer than several minutes, periodically place the fish back in the water or place in a live well to allow it to breathe.

#### **RELEASING**

Considerable time and care should be exercised when releasing fish. Fish should be placed in the water and held by the base of the tail. If the fish does not swim away from your grasp on its own, gently move it forward in the water to get water flowing over the gills. For best results, move the fish in the forward direction only instead of back and forth. A fish's gills somewhat resemble the pages of a book and are designed for water flow in only one direction. Moving the fish in a slow circle or gently towing it behind the boat will accomplish this.

## **WORLD RECORD REQUIREMENTS**

Game fish catches can only be considered for world record status if they are caught according to International Angling Rules. Following is information on world record categories, requirements, and procedures for filing claims. An application fee of \$50 U.S. for members and \$80 U.S. for non-members is required for each claim. All materials submitted become the property of IGFA.

## **WORLD RECORD CATEGORIES**

### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

IGFA maintains world records for both freshwater and saltwater game fish in all tackle, all-tackle length, line class, tippet class and junior angler categories.. In order to qualify for a record, a catch must be a minimum of 1 pound (.453 kg) in weight, and must outweigh the existing record by the required amount or meet the minimum weight requirements, if any, for vacant records.

No applications will be accepted for fish caught in hatchery waters, sanctuaries or small bodies of water that are stocked with fish for commercial purposes. The intent of this rule shall prevail and IGFA retains the right to determine its applicability on a case by case basis. The catch must not be at variance with any laws or regulations governing the species or the waters in which it was caught.

When an additional species of game fish is made eligible for IGFA world records, the effective date will be announced. Fish caught on or after the effective date will be eligible for records. Announcement of an additional species in the World Record Game Fishes book or in other IGFA publications will be considered proper notification in lieu of any other notice.

If an angler submits more than one application for the same record, caught on the same day, only the heaviest or longest of the fish will be accepted.

### **ALL-TACKLE CATEGORY**

*All-Tackle world records* are kept for the heaviest fish of a species caught by an angler in any line class up to 130 lb (60 kg). Fish caught on lines designed to test over the 130 lb (60 kg) class will not be considered for record claims.

All-tackle record claims are considered for all species of fish caught according to IGFA angling rules.

Applications for species not currently included in the IGFA line class and tippet class listings must meet the following criteria:

1. The fish must represent a valid species with a recognized scientific name.
2. The fish must be identifiable based on photos and other supporting data presented with the application.
3. The fish must be considered "trophy-sized." A rule of thumb is that the weight must fall within the top half of the estimated maximum weight of the species. If no maximum weight is available, it must fall within the top half of the maximum reported length for the species. Maximum reported weight and length for species may be found at [www.fishbase.org](http://www.fishbase.org) or from other reputable sources.

### **ALL-TACKLE LENGTH CATEGORY**

*All-Tackle Length World Records* are kept for the longest fish of each eligible species caught according to the IGFA International Angling Rules in any Line Class up to 60 kg. (130 lb.) and released alive.

### **JUNIOR ANGLER CATEGORIES**

*Junior World Records* are kept for the heaviest fish of each eligible species in any Line Class up to 60 kg. (130 lb.). Junior records are kept for both male and female anglers

ages 1116. All species recognized for Line Class records and Tippet Class records are also recognized for Junior records. All IGFA International Angling Rules apply, with the exception that fish do not have to be weighed on land.

*Smallfry World Records* are kept for the heaviest fish of each eligible species in any Line Class up to 60 kg. (130 lb.). Smallfry records are kept for both male and female anglers ages 10 and under. All species recognized for Line Class records and Tippet Class records are also recognized for Smallfry records. All IGFA International Angling Rules apply, with the exception that fish do not have to be weighed on land.

**LINE CLASS & FLY ROD CATEGORIES**

*Line Class World Records* are kept for each eligible species according to the breaking strength of the first 5 meters (16.5 feet) of line directly preceding the double line, leader or hook. This section must be comprised of a single, homogeneous piece of line. For all Line Class records, the weight of the fish must be at least ½ of the Line Class used to make the catch.

*Tippet Class World Records* are kept for the eligible species according to the breaking strength of the class tippet. For all Tippet Class records, the weight of the fish must be at least ½ of the Tippet Class used to make the catch. World records are kept in the following Line and Tippet classes:

## LINE TESTING

IGFA tests all line and tippet samples submitted with world record claims in accordance with the metric line class designations, which vary slightly from the standard U.S. customary designations. For example, the U.S. customary equivalent of 4 kilograms is 8.81 pounds. Thus, line designated by the manufacturer as 8 lb class line may test up to 8.81 pounds (4 kg) to qualify for an 8 lb line class record. The U.S. customary equivalents in pounds for the metric line classes are as follows:

Line and tippet samples submitted with record claims are uniformly tested in accordance with Government specifications, which have been modified and supplemented by IGFA.

*Note: ICFA offers a line and tippet testing service for members only.*

## RECORD CATCH REGULATIONS

### GENERAL INFORMATION

1. Protested applications or disputed existing records will be referred to the IGFA Executive Committee for review. Its decisions will be final. IGFA reserves the right to refuse to consider an application or grant a claim for a record application. All IGFA decisions will be based upon the intent of the regulations.

2. Any and all claims and/or disputes regarding the IGFA International Angling Rules shall be governed by and construed and enforced in accordance with, the laws of the State of Florida, without regard to such jurisdiction's conflict of laws principles. In the event that parties are unable to mutually resolve any dispute, controversy or claim arising out of, in connection with, or in relation to the IGFA International Angling Rules, such dispute, controversy or claim shall be resolved by litigation; in that connection, each of the parties to such dispute hereby

(i) irrevocably and unconditionally consents to submit itself to the sole and exclusive personal jurisdiction of any federal or state court located within Broward County, Florida (the "Applicable Courts"),

(ii) waives any objection to the laying of sole and exclusive venue of any such litigation in any of the Applicable Courts,

(iii) agrees not to plead or claim in any such court that such litigation brought therein has been brought in an inconvenient forum and agrees not to otherwise attempt to deny or defeat such personal jurisdiction or venue by motion or other request for leave from any such court, and

(iv) agrees that it will not bring any action, suit, or proceeding in connection with any dispute, claim or controversy arising out of or relating to the Angling Rules in

any court or other tribunal other than any of the Applicable Courts. Nothing in this Section shall prevent enforcement in another forum of any judgment obtained in the Applicable Courts.

In the event that it shall become necessary for any party to take action of any type whatsoever to enforce the terms of the IGFA International Angling Rules, the prevailing Party shall be entitled to recover all its costs, including attorneys' fees, costs, and expenses, including all out-of-pocket expenses that are not taxable as costs, incurred in connection with any such action, including any negotiations, mediations, arbitrations, litigation, and appeal.

3. When a substantial award is specifically offered for a world record catch in any line or tippet class, only a claim for an all-tackle record will be considered.

4. In some instances, an IGFA officer or member of the International Committee or a deputy from a local IGFA member club may be asked to recheck information supplied on a claim. Such action is not to be regarded as doubt of the formal affidavit, but rather as evidence of the extreme care with which IGFA investigates and maintains its records.

### **SPECIES IDENTIFICATION**

1. Photographs must be submitted by which positive identification of the exact species can be made. Read the rules on photographs at the end of this section, and refer to the Species Identification section in the World Record Game Fishes book to determine which features must show to identify your fish. Applications without photographs will not be accepted.

2. If there is the slightest doubt that the fish cannot be properly identified from the photographs and other data submitted, the fish should be examined by an ichthyologist or qualified fishery biologist before a record application is submitted to IGFA. The scientist's signature and title (or qualifications) should appear on the IGFA application form or on a separate document confirming the identification of the species.

3. If a scientist is not available, the fish should be retained in a preserved or frozen condition until a qualified authority can verify the species or until notified by IGFA that the fish need no longer be retained.

4. If no decision can be made from the photographs and the angler can provide no further proof of the identification of the species, the record claim will not be considered.

### **WITNESSES TO CATCH**

On all record claims, witnesses to the catch are highly desirable if at all possible. Unwitnessed catches may be disallowed if questions arise regarding their authenticity. It is important that the witnesses can attest to the angler's compliance with the IGFA International Angling Rules and Equipment Regulations.

### **MINIMUM WEIGHT REQUIREMENTS**

For all Line Class and Tippet Class categories, the catch must weigh at least ½ as much as the Line Class or Tippet Class. For example, a fish entered for the 6 kg. (12 lb.) Line Class or Tippet Class category must weigh a minimum of 2.72 kg. (6 lb.).

### **WEIGHTS NEEDED TO DEFEAT OR TIE EXISTING RECORDS**

1. To replace a record for a fish weighing less than 25 pounds (11.33 kg), the replacement must weigh at least 2 ounces (56.69 gm) more than the existing record.

2. To replace a record fish weighing 25 pounds (11.33 kg) or more, the replacement must weigh at least one half of 1 percent more than the existing record.

Ex: At 100 pounds (45.35 kg) the additional weight required would be 8 ounces (226.7 gm); at 200 pounds (90.71 kg) the additional weight required would be 1 pound (.453 kg).

3. A catch which matches the weight of an existing record or exceeds the weight by less than the amount required to defeat the record will be considered a tie. In case of a tie claim involving more than two catches, weight must be compared with the original record (first fish to be caught). Nothing weighing less than the original record will be considered. In the event of an angler tying an existing record they currently hold; the catch must weigh at least 28.35 grams (1 ounce) greater than their current record to qualify for a tie

### **TIME LIMIT ON CLAIMS**

With the exception of all-tackle records only, claims for record fish caught in U.S. continental waters must be received by IGFA within 60 days of the date of catch. Claims for record fish caught in other waters must be received by IGFA within three months of the date of catch.

### **WEIGHING REQUIREMENTS**

1. All fish submitted for record consideration must be weighed on scales that have been certified for accuracy by government agencies or other qualified and accredited organizations within the past 12 months. Disinterested witnesses to the weight should be used whenever possible. If at the time of weighing the fish the scale has not been properly certified within the past twelve months, it must be checked and certified for accuracy as quickly as possible, and an official report stating the findings of the inspection prior to any adjustment of the scale must be included with the record application.

2. The weight of the sling, platform, or rope (if one is used to secure the fish on the scales) must be determined and deducted from the total weight.

3. No estimated weights will be accepted. With the exception of Junior and Smallfry records, fish must be weighed on land

4. Only weights indicated by the graduations on the scale will be accepted. Visual fractionalizing of these graduations is not allowed. Any weights that fall between two graduations on the scale must be rounded to the lower of the two.

5. IGFA reserves the right to require any scale to be re-certified for accuracy if there are any indications that the scale might not have weighed correctly.

*Note: IGFA offers a scale certification service for IGFA members at a fee of \$40 USD.*

### **PREPARATION OF CLAIMS**

To apply for a world record, the angler must submit a completed IGFA application form, the mandatory length of line and terminal tackle (described below) used to catch the fish, and acceptable photographs of the fish, the tackle used to catch the fish, the scale used to weigh the fish, and the angler with the fish.

### **APPLICATION FORM**

A current, official IGFA world record application form must be used for record claims. This form may be found on the [www.igfa.org](http://www.igfa.org) website or in the 2021 World Record Game Fishes book. No other version of the application form will be accepted.

When making any record claim, the angler must indicate the specified strength of the line or tippet used to catch the fish. In the cases of Line Class and Tippet Class records, this will place the claim in an IGFA Line or Tippet Class category (see Line

Class and Tippet Class categories). All lines and tippets will be examined by IGFA to verify the specified strength of the line. If the line or tippet over tests its class, the application will be considered in the next highest class. If the line or tippet under tests into a lower Line or Tippet Class, the application will not be considered for the lower Line Class or Tippet Class. The heaviest Line Class permitted for both freshwater and saltwater records is 60 kg. (130 lb.). The heaviest Tippet Class permitted for Tippet Class records is 10 kg. (20 lb.). If the line or tippet over tests these maximum strengths, the claim will be denied

Extreme care should be exercised in measuring the fish, as the measurements are often important for weight verification and scientific studies. See the measurement diagram on the record application to be sure you have measured correctly.

The angler is responsible for obtaining the necessary signatures and correct addresses of the boat captain (where applicable), weighmaster (where applicable) and witnesses on the application. If an IGFA officer or representative, or an officer or member of an IGFA club is available, he or she should be asked to witness the claim. The angler must appear in person before a qualified authority to have an application notarized. In locations where notarization is not possible or customary, the signature of a government official, a member of an embassy, legation or consular staff or an IGFA officer or representative may replace notarization. Applications delivered to the IGFA Headquarters in person do not require notarization

Any deliberate falsification of an application will disqualify the applicant for any future IGFA world record and any existing records will be nullified.

### **LINE OR TIPPET SAMPLE**

All applications caught on fly fishing tackle must be accompanied by the fly, the entire tippet and the entire leader connected in one piece

All applications caught on conventional tackle must be accompanied by the entire leader (including the hook or hooks), the double line and at least 5 meters (16.5 feet) closest to the double line, leader or hook. All line samples and the leader (if one is used) are to be submitted in one piece. Broken or incomplete line samples must be accompanied by a full explanation. The IGFA reserves the right to reject applications with broken line samples that prevent it from testing the breaking strength and/or verifying the length of the double line and leader. If a lure is used with the leader, the leader should be cut at the eye attachment to the lure. Each line sample must be submitted in a manner that it can be easily unwound without damage to the line. A recommended method is to take a rectangular piece of stiff cardboard and cut notches in two opposite ends. Secure one end of the line to the cardboard and wind the line around the cardboard through the notched areas. Secure the other end, and write your name and the specified strength of the line on the cardboard. Any line sample submitted that is tangled or cannot be easily unwound will not be accepted.

### **PHOTOGRAPHIC REQUIREMENTS**

Photographs showing the full length of the fish, the rod and reel used to make the catch, and the scale used to weigh the fish must accompany each record application. A photograph of the angler with the fish is also required. For species identification, the clearest possible photos should be submitted. This is especially important in the cases of hybrids and fishes that may be confused with similar species. Shark applications should include a photograph of the shark's teeth and of the head and back taken from above in addition to the photographs taken from the side. Whether the shark has or does not have a ridge between the dorsal fins should be clearly evident in this photograph for identification purposes.

For best results, photograph the fish broadside to the camera so that no part of the fish is obscured. The fins should be fully extended and not obscured with the hands in cases where the number of spines and rays need to be counted. When photographing a fish lying on its side, the surface beneath the fish should be smooth and a ruler or marked tape placed beside the fish if possible. Photographs from various angles are most helpful. An additional photograph of the fish on the scale with actual weight visible is also helpful. It is important that we have clear, publishable photographs of the fish and the angler, including action shots, if available. Original, high resolution digital files are preferred and will assist the IGFA in publicizing the world record catch. The IGFA encourages anglers to release record fish whenever possible and we prefer to see photos of fish carefully being held horizontally, and not vertically, to prevent harming the fish.

Note: IGFA's quarterly magazine, the *International Angler*, keeps anglers up to date on world record catches. It is important that we have clear, publishable photographs of the fish and the angler. If you have action shots of the catch, we would like to see them also.

**CONVERSION FORMULAS FOR WEIGHTS & MEASURES**

Persons submitting world record claims are required to provide the weights and measurements of the fish in the units in which they were taken. The following formulas are provided for your information.

**RELEASE RULES AND RECOMMENDATIONS**

Many fishing tournaments, especially for billfish, use IGFA's angling rules as their foundation. Central to this is the belief that IGFA rules stipulate that a fish is considered caught once the leader is wound to the rod tip or grasped by the mate or other person. However, no such language exists in IGFA's angling rules because these rules were designed for world records where the fish is not considered caught until it was weighed. Over the years, IGFA has been approached by numerous individuals to codify a set of release rules. It is IGFA's hope that establishing a definition for an official release will not only institute a standard by which anglers can compare releases, but also, and more importantly, encourage anglers to continue releasing fish. At its recent annual board meeting in January, the IGFA Board of Trustees approved the following:

IGFA will consider a fish officially released when one of the following actions is completed:


- A. The mate is able to grab the leader
- B. The swivel hits the rod tip
- C. The connection (knot, splice, etc.) between the leader and the mainline/double line/ fly line passes through the rod tip


Leader lengths must conform to current IGFA tackle requirements. Specifically, for

line up to and including 10 kg (20 lb) the leader may not exceed 15 feet. In lines over 10 kg (20 lb), the leader may not be in excess of 30 feet. All leader measurements are inclusive of the lure or hook arrangement and are measured to the bend of the last hook. IGFA tackle requirements for fly fishing do not stipulate a maximum overall length for fly leaders. However, since IGFA rules do not allow class tippets heavier than 10 kg (20 lb), IGFA will adopt the convention of allowing a maximum fly leader length of 15 feet in keeping in accordance with the regulations for conventional tackle. Fly leader length is inclusive of the fly and will be measured to the bend of the last hook. Shock tippets may not measure more than 12 inches (30.48 cm) in length and class tippets must be a minimum of 15 inches (38.10 cm) in length.

In addition to the suggested rule above, IGFA also recommends the following best practices for safe and ethical release of fish.

- Circle hooks are encouraged when fishing with live or dead natural bait. The hook should be removed if possible and will not cause additional harm to angler or fish.
- If the hook cannot be removed, the leader should be cut as close to hook as possible.
- Mates should refrain from manually breaking or “popping” leaders because this can cause additional harm to fish, especially those not hooked in the jaw.
- Ample time should be taken to revive exhausted fish by gently moving them forward in the water to get water flowing over the gills.
- Knotless, rubber coated nets should be used on fish that are netted.




Figure 1. Map of BSF reef site, 400 yards in diameter, indicates the August 14<sup>th</sup>, 2017 locations of concrete materials deployed in the northeast quadrant of the reef.

SAVANNAH SPORT FISHING CLUB  
PERPETUAL TROPHIES

Angler of the Year  
TED DARVOE TROPHY

Ted Darvoe was a real pioneer of Gulf Stream fishing off the coast of Savannah. Aboard his infamous "C-Pad," Ted was one of the first fishermen to make the 70-plus mile trip to the Stream on a regular basis. He developed many of the techniques that are still used to this day for fishing the Stream. Perhaps Ted's greatest attribute was his unselfishness in sharing all he had learned about Blue Water fishing with Club members.

Skipper of the Year  
NEIL MINGLEDORFF TROPHY

Although the Skipper of the Year trophy has been around since 1971, it was renamed in Neil's honor in 1999. Neil was instrumental in organizing the Club, and served as its first president, in 1967. He was a Charter member and an Honorary member at the time of his death in 1998. Neil was also the first recipient of the Skipper of the Year Trophy in 1971.

CAPTAIN BOBBY HAINES MEMORIAL TROPHY

This trophy was established to recognize the top skipper in the club's original Billfish Tournament. It is now awarded to the top skipper in the Blue Water division of the annual Blue Water Tournament. Bobby Haines was the Captain aboard Bob Minis's "Lavango IV" from West Palm Beach, Florida. He was instrumental in introducing different fishing techniques from South Florida to our club and the Savannah area. The Club viewed him as a pioneer of sportfishing during its early years.

Young Angler of the Year  
THE WOODY WOODWARD MEMORIAL TROPHY

Woody was one of the organizers of the first Young Anglers Tournament in 1983. He continued to promote youth recognition to the level it is today. Woody was the Club's ninth President during the years 1984-1985. His memorial trophy was presented to the Club by a group of members who often fished with Woody. The Woody Woodward Trophy was first presented to Ben Wall, in 1996.

ROSALIND DEMERE MEMORIAL TROPHY

Rosalind Demere was an enthusiastic, competitive "powderpuffer" who enjoyed fishing among the lady anglers. She chaired the Powder Puff Tournament when her husband, Rob, was president of the club. The trophy was given in memory of Rosalind by a group of ladies who admired her enthusiasm. This trophy is awarded to the top anglers in the ladies' annual Powder Puff Tournament.

## JAMES LYNNAH PERPETUAL TROPHY

The James Lynnah Perpetual Trophy is presented annually to The Savannah Sport Fishing Club Participant of the Year. The basis for nomination will be participation in SSFC events, tournaments, weigh-ins, attendance at general meetings, assisting as a volunteer and enjoying the social aspects of our club activities. This is an individual award and not a boat or crew award. Current sitting board and executive committee members are ineligible to win this award.


